"The owners' passion for motocross really became the basis for the entire design of the home," relates David Webber, AIA, principal of Austin-based Webber + Studio, Inc. "It also became a clearly Texan sort of structuresomething fresh and interesting that was evocative of old Texas architecture." Webber devised three separate structures: a barn to house motocross racing bikes, tractors and four-wheelers for the owners' four children; a pavilion with a fireplace, restrooms and showers for hosting special events and gatherings; and an expansive, 5,000-square-foot cabin to serve as the family home. All the buildings abut an ellipsis-ringed road that mimics the curves of a motocross track. Even the buildings themselves display a slight curve.

That rich Texas history informed the design and interior of the house. For example, the main cabin resembles an old barn converted into a house, with its exposed beams, pecan flooring made from trees harvested on a nearby property, rustic stone fireplaces crafted of limestone and sandstone from
